BRONZE BEAVER AWARD

The Bronze Beaver Award is given in recognition of distinguished service to the Institute and/or its Association of Alumni and Alumnae by alumni who have been active in most or all phases of alumni activity and who have been outstanding in at least one phase. This award is the highest honor the Association can bestow upon any of its members.

Describe the nominee's **Breadth of Service:** Contributions in different dimensions of alumni service (Alumni Association and elsewhere at the Institute). What volunteer roles have they held? How have these roles represented the nominee's various skills and affinities? How have they had an impact in a variety of areas in service to the MIT community?

Describe the nominee's **Depth of Service:** leadership or role model contributions in one (or more) areas. What roles has this person excelled at? What deep impacts have they made? How have they inspired and led others? What examples are there of their work exceeding expectations?

Describe the nominee's **Tenure:** years of service and dependability over time. How many years has the nominee been volunteering? Did they begin close after graduation or as a student? Have they followed through on volunteer work? Has their attendance at meetings or events been consistent and reliable?

The Harold E. Lobdell '17 Distinguished Service Award, established in 1979, is given in recognition of alumni relations service of special depth over a sustained period. Lobdell's interest and commitment to MIT spanned all areas of alumni relations.

The George B. Morgan '20 Award was established in 1979 to recognize sustained excellence in all aspects of Educational Council activity, including dedication to MIT, an abiding concern for and sensitivity to the interests of prospective students, and exceptional standards of achievement and professionalism in meeting council responsibilities.

The Margaret L. A. MacVicar '65, ScD '67 Award, established in 2015, is awarded to individuals with one to 10 years of volunteer service to recognize innovation, dedication, and meaningful impact for the Alumni Association or the Institute in any area of volunteer activity, demonstrating strong potential for future volunteer leadership for the Association. This award may recognize new volunteers, volunteers new to specific roles, and volunteers who may start later in life and will show a direction towards an example of what to aspire to as a volunteer.

GREAT DOME AWARD

Established in 1968, the Great Dome Award (formerly known as the Presidential Citation) is the highest honor the Association bestows upon any of its organizations. Like the Bronze Beaver for individuals, this award is given to groups in recognition of distinguished service to the Institute or the Association.

Introduction: Describe why you are nominating this group in a sentence or two. What is your relationship to the group? Have you nominated them before? Are you excited to submit their name for consideration?

Impact: contributions relative to the size of the target community. How were this group's accomplishments successful within the scope of their size/constituencies? What special way did this group's efforts affect others broad or small?

Scope: number of people left with a positive impression of MIT (alumni or not) [size]. Did these efforts advance the position of MIT among its alumni, students, and the public? How many people did it affect?

Transformational Value: significant improvement in a model for future organizations or groups. Did these group's accomplishments form a blueprint or best practice for other groups to follow? How did these efforts inspire and direct others toward success?

HONORARY MEMBERSHIP IN THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION

The constitution of the Alumni Association, adopted at its annual meeting held on December 30, 1897, provided that anyone who has rendered outstanding service to the Association or the Institute, including any present or former member of the Corporation or any present or former officer of administration or instruction on the staff of the Institute, as well as their spouses, may be elected an Honorary Member.

Introduction: Describe why you are nominating this person in a sentence or two. How do you know the nominee? Have you nominated them before? Why are you excited to submit their name for consideration?

Describe the nominee's **Impact On Students/Faculty/Staff**: contributions having a positive impact on the MIT campus. Was this individual a faculty member who had a significant influence on students or an academic department? Was this person the spouse of MIT Senior Leadership or faculty, who made considerable contributions to MIT and its community?



Describe the nominee's **Impact on Alumni**: contributions having a positive impact on MIT alumni. How has the nominee supported alumni, the Alumni Association, or its programming? How did they first become involved with MIT and the Alumni Association?
