

Bridging the Americas and dividing two oceans, Costa Rica and Panama are small, neighboring nations brimming with wonders. At this tropical crossroads, waterfalls cascade from misty mountains into winding jungle rivers, where the canopies are alive with a wild symphony of roaring howler monkeys and squawking scarlet macaws. It's easy to see how Costa Rica's pristine beauty inspired the popular greeting, pura vida—or "pure life." Then, amid Panama's lush wilderness, stands an astonishing triumph of human ingenuity: the monumental lock system of the Panama Canal.

Discover these remote rainforests, idyllic islands and feats of engineering aboard the small and purpose-built *National Geographic Quest*. With large expanses of glass to keep you connected to extraordinary views, this nimble, 50-cabin vessel is perfectly designed to sail along the sinuous channels and hidden coves of wild places, from Costa Rica's jungle-shrouded Osa Peninsula to Panama's idyllic Coiba Island. We also have special permission to transit the Panama Canal over two days, which allows us to take in eye-level views of its intricate workings and witness the spectacle of its dazzling illumination from a variety of perspectives.

During the trip, **MIT Professor Andrew J. Whittle** will deliver lectures and informal commentary about the Panama Canal. Also, a knowledgable and experienced expedition team is always on hand to help you spot endemic agouti, fiery-billed aracaris and other fascinating species hidden in the dense forest canopy. Plus, a certified photo instructor is dedicated to helping you capture the photos of a lifetime. Travel by Zodiac or kayak past the tranquil mangroves of Golfo Dulce in Costa Rica's southernmost reaches. Snorkel among thousands of colorful fish, glide across turquoise waters on a stand-up paddleboard or simply relax on golden sands.

This voyage gives you the chance to immerse yourself in one of the most biodiverse places on Earth and one of the most important waterways in history. He joined the MIT faculty as an Assistant Professor in 1988, became a Full Professor in 2000 and served as Head of the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering, 2009-2013. Dr. Whittle is an expert in geotechnical

engineering, whose research deals principally with modeling the complex mechanical properties of soils and rocks and their application in predicting the performance of large infrastructure projects.

COSTA RICA: STEWARDS OF THE WILD

A Wilderness of Epic Proportions

When travelers step into the tangled tropical forests of Corcovado National Park on Costa Rica's Osa Peninsula, it is immediately evident why *National Geographic* magazine dubbed it "the most biologically intense place on Earth." The reserve is a sanctuary for some 140 mammal species in 12 major ecosystems, ranging from coastal mangrove swamps to highland forests that reach into the clouds.

The park is a powerful draw for nature lovers, most of whom visit via inland ranger stations. However, National Geographic-Lindblad Expeditions travelers arrive directly on Corcovado's beaches, where we hike into the jungle as the sleepy stillness breaks into a cacophony of bird chirps and monkey chatters. Stop and swim in a waterfall pool, or continue to trek along the river, deeper into Corcovado's wild interior. Either route leads to incredible wildlife sightings, whether it's the flash of a scarlet macaw, foraging coatis or, with luck, a glimpse of a grazing tapir.

Preserving Nature, Nurturing Tradition

Costa Rica is deeply invested in protecting the natural resources that are a critical driver of their economy. On an expedition here, you might chat with coffee farmers who grow their beans in the shadow of the jungle canopy, creating new habitats for birds. Or, you may meet a gold miner who walked away from the mines to protect land where he now demonstrates the practice of panning for gold in mountain rivers—the same clear waters that have become gold for Costa Rica's green-based economy.

THE PANAMA CANAL: A STORIED CROSSING BETWEEN TWO OCEANS

More than a century after its completion, the Panama Canal stands as a critical achievement in commercial and engineering history. Transiting this storied passageway aboard the National Geographic Quest means learning about a modern wonder from the inside out—and gaining



in-depth perspectives on its economic, mechanical, and political impact from the experts who sail the canal alongside us.

Just beyond the gates of this engineering marvel, we experience a dramatic change in scenery. The concrete walls of the canal stand in sharp contrast to the surrounding leafy jungles, where flora and fauna have thrived thanks to preservation efforts aimed at sustaining the health of this vital ecological corridor.

Step ashore at Barro Colorado Island for an exclusive visit to the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute and learn about the lush lowland tropical forests that have drawn biologists from across the globe to Panama since 1932. On a Zodiac excursion to the tiny "monkey islands," get a wild greeting from the curious primates that approach the vessels as we navigate the shoreline. Or, walk along the elevated boardwalks of the Panama Rainforest Discovery Center trail, through a canopy that harbors a rainbow of some 400 bird species.

The nimble, 50-cabin National Geographic Quest is designed to sail along sinuous channels and provide up-close experiences. Her open decks and large windows keep you connected to extraordinary views of turquoise waters and leafy shorelines draped in a thousand shades of green. A fleet of kayaks, stand-up paddleboards and Zodiacs allows us to glide into a quiet cove or a serene bay for a solitary snorkeling excursion. After a day of exploring, gather in the lounge to hear our naturalists discuss the wonders we witness each day, or visit the open Bridge and watch the crew navigate the canals and bays that make these waters so extraordinary to explore.

Travel with a World-Class Expedition Team

Each of the guides—from naturalists to expedition leaders—is committed to ensuring you have an unforgettable experience. The expedition team is curated to ensure that you are getting in-depth perspectives from veteran and locally based experts who have deeply personal connections to the region. Exploring in small groups, you will have the opportunity to hear different perspectives every day, and because there are no group assignments, you can gravitate toward naturalists who share your interests.

Photography is also central to the expedition experience. On this voyage you will be joined by National Geographic photographer Tamara Merino Bloch, as well as a National Geographic certified photo instructor, who will assist travelers with everything from camera settings to composition. Every guest—from smartphone camera users to advanced hobbyists—can stand side by side with top photographers, pick up tips in the field, and return home with extraordinary images you can enjoy for years to come.

Itinerary

Exploring Costa Rica and Panama is a singular experience that combines incredible biodiversity with an in-depth crossing of the Panama Canal. Adventures abound amid the region's rainforests, rivers and beaches. Hike deep into the jungle or kayak and stand-up paddleboard in tropical turquoise waters. Swim in a waterfall pool or snorkel amid vibrant coral reefs. Also, enjoy an exclusive opportunity to meet with researchers who rescue, rehabilitate and release Costa Rica's native sea turtles.



DAY 1: SAN JOSÉ, COSTA RICA/PUERTO CALDERA/EMBARK

After arrival in San José this afternoon, we transfer to the Pacific Coast town of Puerto Caldera. This evening, embark the ship *National Geographic Quest* and set sail south for a Central American adventure. (D)

DAY 2: CORCOVADO NATIONAL PARK

Anchor off the Osa Peninsula to see some of the most pristine lowland rainforest on the Pacific coast. In the environs of Corcovado National Park, swim in waterfall pools or trek through the rainforest for a chance to see four species of monkeys: howler, spider, squirrel and capuchin. (B,L,D)

DAY 3: GOLFO DULCE/OSA PENINSULA

Aboard the nimble expedition ship, travel to the upper reaches of the mangrove-fringed Golfo Dulce, along the southwestern edge of Costa Rica. Go ashore on the western side of the bay, in the pristine waters of the Osa Peninsula's Playa Blanca. Head inland to meet families living in remote communities that work with cocoa, heart of palm and sugarcane. Hike mature rainforest or kayak in peaceful waters in Golfo Dulce, the only tropical fjord on the continent. Visit with researchers from the Latin American Sea Turtles (LAST) Association to learn about their rehabilitation efforts in local sea turtle conservation. (B,L,D)

DAY 4: GOLFO DULCE

As this Golfo Dulce exploration continues by Zodiac, paddleboard and kayak, you are likely to encounter Pacific Costa Rica's dazzling avifauna—from goldenhooded and Cherrie's tanagers to yellow-throated toucans, fiery-billed aracaris and crimson-fronted and orange-chinned parakeets, all constantly chattering in flight above the jungle tree line. The flora is a kaleidoscope of tropical color, with bromeliads, heliconias and orchids set against the verdant green of the tropical forest. (B,L,D)

DAY 5: COIBA NATIONAL PARK, PANAMA

Today go ashore on the remote Isla Coiba, one of the many islands of Coiba National Park, a UNESCO World Heritage site. Once a penal colony, the island has long been protected and is accessible by special permit only. Among its many endemic species are the Coiba Island agouti and the mantled howler monkey, as well as four varieties of sea turtle. Discover rich marine life while snorkeling, or simply spend the afternoon exploring or relaxing on the beach. (B,L,D)

DAY 6: GULF OF PANAMA ISLETS/PANAMA CANAL TRANSIT

Today, explore the tiny islets of the Gulf of Panama by Zodiac. Here you might spot frigatebirds, brown pelicans, neotropical cormorants and brown boobies. Set sail for the Panama Canal this afternoon. Stretching more than 50 miles, the canal is a colossal engineering feat completed in 1914. It is still traversed by some 14,000 ships every year. (B,L,D)

DAY 7: GATÚN LAKE/PANAMA CANAL TRANSIT

Today, choose hikes and Zodiac cruises at the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute facility on Barro Colorado Island, or take a boat ride to the mouth of the Chagres River and hike on the Panama Rainforest Discovery Center trails. This evening, continue through the complex lock system of the canal. (B,L,D)

DAY 8: COLÓN/PANAMA CITY, PANAMA/DISEMBARK

After breakfast, disembark in Colón and transfer to the airport in Panama City for your flight home. (B)


Staff & Crew
